

Education Minister Unveils 50 TETFund-Sponsored Academic Textbooks

The Minister of Education, Dr. Maruf Alausa has unveiled 50 Tunji indigenous academic textbooks sponsored by Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) aimed at improving availability textbooks of and transforming tertiary education in the country.

The public presentation, held under the Higher Education Book Development Intervention of the Fund, showcased a significant shift towards locally produced, high-quality learning materials that will reduce Nigeria's dependence on foreign publications.

Speaking at the landmark event held at the TETFund Auditorium in Abuja, the Minister highlighted the chronic shortage of locally authored textbooks and stressed that fostering quality indigenous content is vital for academic relevance and economic efficiency.

"Nurturing the culture of quality authorship will not only ensure the availability of relevant books for our diverse educational needs but also safeguard our national pride by reducing the demand for foreign exchange," he declared.

The Minister also praised President Bola Ahmed Tinubu's administration for its robust commitment to education, underscoring the President's role in prioritizing funding and policy reforms to boost content development and capacity building in Public Tertiary Institutions.



Similarly, the Chairman, **TETFund** Board of Trustees (BOT) Rt. Hon Bello who Aminu Masari represented by the Board Member representing the South- West Zone, Rt. Hon. Sunday Adepoju reiterated the unwavering integrity Fund's transparency, noting that TETFund's innovative interventions have been widely acknowledged as robust and contributing significantly the development of the education sector in Nigeria.

He revealed plans to introduce new projects in medical simulation, alternative energy, and other innovative fields, aimed at enhancing teaching, learning, and research across Nigeria's tertiary institutions. "Our mission to reduce over reliance on foreign academic materials remains steadfast," he emphasized.



In his remarks, the Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono elaborated on the success of the TETFund Higher Education Book Development Intervention, disclosing that the reconstituted Technical Advisory Group (TAG) had reviewed 130 manuscripts, leading to the production of 50 textbooks this year and another 60 scheduled for unveiling before the end of 2025.

He also announced a significant change in the remuneration model, as authors will now be compensated based on the number of pages in their books rather than copies on produced. He acknowledged critical support of the Minister of Education. and reiterated the aovernment's commitment to educational excellence.

In addition, the Chairman of the TETFund Technical Advisory Group, Prof. Albert Abegunde revealed that the 50 textbooks were commissioned five distinguished publishing houses, and they span nine academic disciplines including Medicine, Law, Technology, Agriculture, among reinforcing others, the initiative's comprehensive approach revamping academic resources in Nigerian Tertiary Institutions.

TETFund Announces 2025 Allocation to Beneficiaries

The Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) has announced the Year 2025 allocation to its Beneficiary Institutions as approved by President Bola Ahmed Tinubu.

This was disclosed by the Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono at the One-day Strategic Workshop with Heads of TETFund's Beneficiary Institutions on the 2025 Disbursement Guidelines, held at the TETFund Auditorium in Abuja, recently.

Arc. Sonny Echono disclosed that each University will aet N2,560,562.352.66 as Annual Direct Disbursement, each Polytechnic N1,794,335.731.71 and each College of Education to get N1,978,428,260.79 in line with the 2:1:1 ratio stipulated by the TETFund Establishment Act. He will added that Universities get N300,000,000.00 Zonal as Intervention, while Polytechnics and Education Colleges of get N200,000,000.00 respectively.

He explained that the year 2024 was marked by significant achievements for the Fund, as many programmes and projects were implemented as approved by the Board of Trustees (BOT).

Speaking further, he intimated that throughout the year, the addressed key challenges, including issues of distressed projects, suspension of the foreign component of the Fund's Academic Staff Training programme, sustenance of ICT roadmap; especially the need for beneficiary institutions to fully embrace and utilize the Beneficiary Identity Management System (BIMS) and Tertiary Education Research and Application Services (TERAS) platform.

"The Fund has significantly increased the allocation for Research & Innovation, Academic Staff Training and Development, as well as Manuscript and Book Development. It has also significantly increased the numbers of beneficiary institutions for its special and designated projects," he said.

The TETFund Boss expressed appreciation to President Bola Ahmed Tinubu for his painstaking efforts in sustaining allocation efficiency; as well as prudent deployment of the Fund's resources to achieve desired impacts, while he also commended the Federal Inland Revenue Service (FIRS) under the leadership of Mr. Zaccheus Adelabu Adedeji for the sustained improvement in revenue collection.

Arc. Sonny Echono also announced the Fund's key initiatives and expansion of the Special High Impact Programme (SHIP), completion of the National Library, establishment of mechanized farms in some universities, and accelerated provision of student hostels through public-private partnerships and direct construction in fulfilment of Mr. President's promise to the student community.



In their separate remarks, the Executive Secretaries of National Board for Technical Education (NBTE), National Universities Commission (NUC), and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) commended the President, National Assembly and Management of TETFund for leading innovative interventions in the country and enhancing quality of tertiary education.

The leadership of the academic unions; ASUU, ASUP and COEASU also applauded the Fund for its vision on 2025 interventions. They conveyed total support for the continuous existence of TETFund, noting that the Fund has sufficient achievement that justifies its continued existence.

The Chairman of the House of Representatives Committee on TETFund and Other Services. Hon. Princess Miriam Onuoha has called on all stakeholders to support the sustenance of the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund).

This is even as she expressed hope that President Bola Ahmed Tinubu would support the continued existence of the Fund, which she said has become the live wire of tertiary education in Nigeria.

Hon. Onuoha made the call while speaking at the inauguration of three TETFund-sponsored projects at Ebonyi State University, Abakaliki recently.

The Committee Chairman who was speaking against the backdrop of the Tax Reform Bill at the National Assembly stated that considering the impactful role TETFund has played in the development of tertiary education in the country, it should be sustained and further strengthened.

"It is therefore not right that the child you have nurtured to grow will be starved of life or the air with which the child deserves to live".




"I believe that the President is a father, and he is a listening President, and he has listened to the reports just as the bill is being read today for the second time in the House of Representatives".

"When it gets to the committee stage, I will be one of those who will champion that you don't throw away the baby with the bathwater," she said.

Continuing, Hon. Onuoha explained that "all that needs to be done, all that has been complained about by stakeholders regarding substandard projects, abandonment, and delay in accessing projects—all of these are the reasons the government and the legislature embark on oversight," she added.

He stated that the Fund would always engage with its beneficiary institutions towards ensuring the delivery of iconic and impactful intervention projects in subsequent intervention years. "TETFund has become the live wire of tertiary education in Nigeria and therefore deserves to be sustained. I say this from the legislature and as the oversight committee, having toured the length and breadth of Nigeria to oversee these projects".

He also announced the Federal Government's directive that TETFund allocation for physical infrastructure in 2025 would be utilized only for maintenance of existing structures.



"Let me use this opportunity to inform you that the government has directed that the 2025 intervention allocation for physical infrastructure will be utilised for the comprehensive rehabilitation/upgrade of old, dilapidated infrastructures, in view of the massive and embarrassing level of decay of existing buildings in our institutions.

"The purpose of this is to give the learning environment a facelift that is conducive for teaching, learning, and research, comparable to what is obtainable abroad. Consequently, no new structures are to be built with the upcoming year 2025 TETFund allocations for physical infrastructure," he stated.

In his remarks, Governor Francis Nwifuru of Ebonyi State, who was represented by his Mrs. Patricia Deputy, congratulated the university community for the successful delivery of the projects. He also commended TETFund its for infrastructural for support development Beneficiary in its Institutions across the country.

Speaking earlier, the Vice Chancellor of the university, Professor Chigozie Ogbu expressed appreciation to TETFund for its support in the provision of infrastructure in the institution, which he noted has resulted in promoting a conducive learning environment for students.

He also commended Governor Nwifuru for his commitment to education, which he said has led to the transformation being witnessed in the university.



















HIGH ELECTRICITY TARIFF: TETFund INAUGURATES STEERING COMMITTEE ON ALTERNATIVE ENERGY SOLUTION

The Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) has inaugurated a steering committee to advise on its Special Power Intervention initiative geared towards providing alternative energy solutions to Beneficiary Institutions with a view to addressing persistent power failure and high cost of electricity tariff.

The Chairman of the TETFund Board of Trustees (BoT), Rt. Hon. Aminu Bello Masari performed the inauguration at the Fund's Headquarters in Abuja recently.

Speaking at the event, the BoT Chairman stated that the high cost of electricity tariff and a combination of other issues have become unbearable and disrupting teaching and learning learning in most public institutions in the country. This, he said, necessitated the Board to create a Special Intervention to assist tertiary institutions in meeting their power demands for more effective learning and research.

He noted that the Special Intervention was in alignment with the Federal Government's efforts to ensure steady power supply in tertiary educational institutions across the country.

Also speaking at the inauguration, the Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono noted that the initiative was in line with the Fund's mandate of repositioning, revitalizing and providing high quality manpower for research and innovation in Beneficiary Institutions for economic development of the country.

"The Fund has recognized a major challenge faced by most public institutions across the country. The issue of electricity and the inability of the institutions to operate optimally has necessitated the need for the alternative energy solution to enable tertiary institutions work effectively without hindrance," he said.

The committee is chaired by the TETFund BoT member representing the South-West geopolitical zone, Hon. Sunday Adepoju and has two months to submit a preliminary report.

MEDICAL SIMULATION INTERVENTION: COMMITTEE SUBMITS REPORT, RECOMMENDS MORE CENTRES ACROSS ZONES

The TETFund Ad-hoc Committee on Medical Simulation and Innovation has submitted the report of its findings with valuable recommendations aimed at improving the healthcare system in Nigeria.

It would be recalled that the Fund set up an Ad-hoc Committee on Medical Simulation and Innovation last November to conduct a gap analysis in medical simulation and healthcare innovation in Nigeria, identify gaps and to propose possible ways of improving on general healthcare system in the country within eight weeks.

Speaking at the event, the Chairman of the committee, a renowned neurosurgeon, Prof. Wale Suleiman highlighted their key findings, stating that "medical simulation centers are non-existence in Nigeria by world standard, adding that there is hardly any adoption or incorporation of world standard mode of education and training for health care workers in Nigeria University.

"Modern educational practices are almost absent in Nigerian universities and lack of resources is especially apparent in the minimal use of advanced technologies like telemedicine and remote patient monitoring, which are essential for improving access to healthcare across the nation.

"We must train our young population to become experts in these innovative technologies to minimize dependency on foreign experts," he said.

Prof. Suleiman reiterated that there was urgent need to invest in medical simulation to address medical gaps and improve Nigeria's capacity to deal with numerous health issues bedeviling the country, especially in the areas of emergency cases, maternal childcare, surgical care, trauma and outbreak of infectious diseases.

He decried the absence of simulation centres in Nigerian institutions, stating that it was limiting healthcare workers' efficiency. He laid emphasis on the need to embrace and invest in new Al-enabled technologies in interpreting medical diagnosis and surgical procedures to be able to meet the growing demands for medical care in the country.

Prof. Suleiman called for the modernization of medical practices in Nigeria and inclusion of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and technology in Nigerian medical field to transform diagnosis and treatment of patients while also urging the Fund to establish multiple medical simulation centres in the six geo-political zones.

He also called for the incorporation of medical simulation in education curriculum in Nigerian institutions.

The Committee recommended the establishment of TETFund Centres of Excellence in Medical Simulation in institutions the selected across country and opined that the of the simulation programmme centres should focus on improving education and training of students in the healthcare field.

"We must train our young population to become experts in these innovative technologies to minimize dependency on foreign experts," he said.

Receiving the report of the committee, the Chairman, Board of Trustees of TETFund, Rt. Hon. Aminu Bello Masari commended members of the committee for their diligence and timely delivery of the assignment and assured them of the consideration of their recommendations by the Board of Trustees.

He described AI as the future and that Nigeria should not be left behind in the new era of technology, especially among the youth.

In his remarks, the Executive Secretary TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono applauded the committee for the quality recommendations and for meeting the timeline for the assignment.

The Executive Secretary of Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund), Arc. Sonny Echono has restated the commitment of the Fund to transforming Nigeria's tertiary education to meet global standards.

Arc. Echono stated this during the 34th Convocation Ceremony of Olabisi Onabanjo University, Ago-Iwoye titled "TETFund and Educational Development in Nigeria: The History, The Treasures, and The Future."

While highlighting the transformative impact of tertiary education on national development, Arc. Echono stated that **TFTFund** made landmark has contributions to the Nigerian higher education sub-sector with over ₩1.8 trillion disbursed to public tertiary institutions and over 152,838 infrastructural projects provided across the institutions. He said the projects include lecture halls. ICT centers. hostels, road networks, and other critical facilities that have significantly improved teaching and learning environments.

part of efforts to strengthen Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) needed to bridge the skills gap in Nigeria, the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) and the Nigerian Academy of Engineering are collaborating towards harnessing the potentials in the technical and vocational fields drive home to sustainable development in the country.

This was formalized by the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) at the TETFund Headquarters in Abuja recently.

Speaking at the occasion, the Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono commended the Academy for its timely intervention at rescuing TVET.

He stated that over the years, several policies, aimed at reforming and strengthening TVET in Nigeria were rolled out, but the policies have all failed to address the technical gap.

"It is high time we stopped talking but take meaningful action about TVET," he said.

Arc. Echono decried the level of obsolete equipment found in most of the laboratories, adding; "the laboratories, the workshops have often contained obsolete equipment, and some do not have required technical hands to manage the facilities. We are still struggling with the issue of power and ensuring that production can take place and teaching and learning can happen."

"The polytechnics, which were intended to be the pillars of TVET in the country are offering courses that have no connection with TVET. It is high time we stopped playing lip service and take steps towards closing the gap that exists in the technical field", he emphasized.

The Executive Secretary confirmed TETFund's commitment and readiness in ensuring that TVET is restored to its full potentials and sustained for economic development in Nigeria.

He also called for partnership with the private and informal sectors in restructuring technical and vocational education training to contribute their much-needed quota to national growth and development.

Expressing his joy and optimism at the event, the President of the Nigeria Academy of Engineering, Engr. Rahamon Adisa Bello said the signing of the MoU marks the beginning of the way forward towards bringing agencies and professional bodies to play their roles in assisting the government in entrenching technical and vocational education training and activities. thereby encouraging technicians and artisans in building the economy.

"It has been established that we have an inverted pyramid in engineering profession. The lack of technicians and artisans is obvious and needs to be reversed," he said.

Federal He commended the Government's National skills (NSQF) qualification Framework recently launched into Level 1-6 Scheme of Service, stating that it is a process towards reawakening TVET. He called for support from concerned bodies to maintain and increase the tempo through realigning and cooperating in charting appropriate stage-by- stage requirements for the objectives of TVET to be actualized.

He added that "the restructuring of both formal and informal technical and vocational education and training is key. While the NSQF formation is meant to assist the informal sector, the revitalization of the formal technical schools is very urgent".

In her remark, President of the Nigerian Society of Engineers (NSE), Engr. Margaret Oguntola stated that there would not be national development without engineering and technical education.

"I think that the signing of this MoU is long overdue because the objective of TVET is very clear. To provide a critical mass of people with the skills for the job. TVET is part of our strategic agenda at NSE, and we have five pillars, and TVET comes under community impact in pillar number four, she said.



"For instance, the implementation of the National Universities Commission (NUC) Core Minimum Academic Curriculum Standard (CCMAS) has been quite challenging across universities as most of them are finding it difficult to implement the uniform areas in the curriculum due to lack of understanding policy among implementers.

We have scheduled a workshop in this regard and TETFund's support is very critical so that the CCMAS vision to promote entrepreneurship and mobilize resources for national prosperity can be achieved," he said.

In his remarks, Director of Research and Centres of Excellence Department of TETFund, Dr. Salisu Girei Bakari, who stood in for the Executive Secretary, Arc. Echono commended the Sonny committee for its foresight and willingness to be leveraged as medium for reaching the academic community on the Fund's interventions.

FRSC Corps Marshal, Malam Shehu Mohammed, made the request during a courtesy visit to the Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono at the Fund's Headquaters in Abuja.

Malam Mohammed commended the magnitude of TETFund's intervention projects in tertiary institutions across the country and emphasized the need for collaboration between the two agencies to reduce road traffic crashes and achieve a zero-casualty rate.



"We have academic institutions, and these institutions were designated in 2023 by an Act to be self-funded outside the budget of Road Safety," Mohammed said.

So it's an opportunity for us to come to TETFund, to appreciate TETFund, and to partner and see what TETFund can do for those institutions to have some infrastructure and funding, so that we can continue to reduce road crashes on Nigerian roads and have safer mobility wherever citizens of Nigeria can go within the country," he added.

The Corps Marshal also revealed FRSC's target of reducing road crashes by 50% with zero fatalities, stressing the importance of technology, research, and continuous personnel training to achieve set goal.

Responding, The Executive Secretary of TETFund, Arc. Sonny Echono expressed TETFund's commitment to collaborating with FRSC, particularly in awareness creation and training to promote safer roads, not only within tertiary institutions but across the country.

Arc. Echono also expressed satisfaction with the digital transformation witnessed in FRSC, saying the move has brought more sanity to roads.



"By embracing technology, you were able to also spread and even bring some visibility to the work you are doing; and I believe the Federal Road Safety Corps has done a very good job in this regard. It has been widely acknowledged that there is a sharp drop in the mortality rate, both in the rates of accidents and also in consequential mortality," he said

Speaking further, Arc, Echono added that "TETFund will collaborate with every agency and organization in advancing the Nigerian project, in stimulating and accelerating the of rate development in our country. - Scalable: Potential to revolutionize small-scale agribusiness across Nigeria.

Prof. Ibrahim Lawal, an agricultural economist at the event, noted: "This is exactly the kind of innovation Nigeria's agro-industry needs—practical, affordable, and sustainable."
